These would not have been reached without the right mix of supportive donors, a multi-skilled and hardworking employee team and a diverse Trustee group willing to embrace change and take on challenges for the common good.

From this it also means that the Foundation is set well for times ahead. Existing donors and the groups supported enjoy working with us and this continues to attract others wanting to help. New Trustees are already refreshing and diversifying the Board and setting more challenging targets for the next chapter. The team working day to day on delivery and development are always eager to make a bigger, better impact.

As I leave the Chair, I firmly believe that the Foundation has made and continues to make a difference. Thank you for whatever part you have played to date and for any who are yet to play. There is still much to be done but with continued goodwill and teamwork from all, who knows what will be achieved?

INTRODUCTION



This was an unprecedented year for the Foundation, responding to a global pandemic with agility and speed, launching our own fundraising appeal, galvanizing support from our amazing donors, building new relationships and distributing vital funds on a weekly basis with the support of dedicated volunteers.

We created flexible programmes to ensure we could support a wide range of projects. We provided the resource, but it is the community sector that delivered on the ground, working tirelessly to support our most vulnerable people.

But we could not have achieved this without our donors and in particular the National Emergency Trust. They chose to work with the UKCF network to distribute the significant funds they raised throughout the pandemic. They were responsive, flexible, and confident that our local knowledge would ensure their money was maximised.

We distributed over £5 million pounds delivering 1,852 grants with grants staff assessing double the number of applications we normally receive over 12 months. A huge thank you to the Foundation team for their commitment and dedication throughout a very difficult period.

As we emerge from the pandemic, our focus is on delivering our new 3-year strategy, it is ambitious, but we know we can achieve our goals with the tenacity and passion we have for the communities we serve.

In our first year of delivering on the strategy we have commissioned an external evaluator to analyse our grant making, identifying gaps which will enable us to set priorities on where our funds are needed most.

We want to be inclusive; we want to be the 'go to' Foundation for all West Midlands and Warwickshire communities and we will achieve this through a Trustee Board that reflects the diversity of our region, a passionate staff team and using evidenced data as continual self-analysis.

Thank you to everyone who supports and believes in us, I hope you enjoy reading this year's annual review.

Literally overnight the helpline went eerily quiet. We planned for this; we knew it would happen. Women had no safe space to make a call, they were literally trapped with their abuser.

I HONESTLY BELIEVE THAT REFUGE IS A SAVIOUR

The nationwide lockdown took moments of safety away from many sufferers of domestic abuse, it was something that Coventry Haven expected.

Jaime Richards, Coventry Haven's
Development & Funding Officer, is a
survivor of domestic abuse and now,
with her team, works above and beyond
to support those most in need. Running
several refuges across the city, staff
members are available day and night.

Awarded £30,000 from the Coronavirus Resilience Fund the money has been used to operate a contingency plan and employ an additional worker over the last year.

Jaime continued:

"Refuges are the bread and butter but it's the hardest to fund. These guys are there all of the time. That's life changing and lifesaving. Once they move out we don't stop the support, they might move into another part of the service, they can ring the helpline at any time."

The grant funded Kelsey's employment, she said:

"My role is to ensure the safety of the ladies; on a weekly basis I'll see them individually. When they come to us we do as much for them as we can so they can relax, they've been through a great ordeal.

"The work we do goes above and beyond our job role to be honest, we do all we can to support them and get them back on their feet. We do get people with mental health issues, drugs and alcohol issues and people who are feeling suicidal so we're there 24 hours.

"I honestly believe that refuge is a saviour, they all say when they leave they 'would've been dead without it.' When you get those results it's an absolutely incredible feeling.

"I was a child in a domestic violence household, now I'm older I can help people and it means everything. I try my hardest and the women are so appreciative. To get them into that good place again it just takes time, a lot of effort but it's lovely."



'ONE MAN'S TRASH IS ANOTHER MAN'S TREASURE'

That is certainly Scrapstore's thought process. Their space in Birmingham's Jewellery Quarter is jampacked with bits and bobs. An arm of the Birmingham Play Care Network (BPCN), the Scrapstore, has been working hard to support families across the city during the pandemic.

Set up in 2011, they take clean business waste, one-off donations and upcycle it - ready for play environments across the city! However, with the closure of centres and schools many children went without vital stimulation.

Emma Payne, Business Development Manager at BCN, explained the challenges faced by families:

"We've found over the pandemic that a high proportion of families don't have enough money to put the heating on, buy food or clothes for their children. To have some play stuff with their families comes sixth, seventh, eighth down their list."

A grant of £8,500 from the Doing Things Differently Fund has helped them distribute more than 3,000 craft packs across the city.

"Somebody donated 1,000 egg boxes so she thought we could do some egg box portraits. Then it's off to the volunteers who beaver away at home ensuring every family has the stuff in their bags and away they go!"

Luckily, on our visit, we were joined by volunteers Sue and Pearl – their first visit in a year! Sue said:

"Coming back today was quite emotional, to be part of the team again is brilliant. We've been working all through lockdown making bags and folders. It's kept us going, it's kept me sane! Then they pick it up and drop another load off, it's good."



IT'S JUST NICE TO SEE

A FRIENDLY FACE netimes it is the little things that

Sometimes it is the little things that make all the difference, that could not be truer for Ann, a beneficiary of the Nuneaton & Bedworth Healthy Living Network's Meals on Wheels service.

The pandemic caused an immediate social void in the lives of many vulnerable and isolated people. Thankfully, with the help of a £1,500 grant from the Coronavirus Resilience Fund, the Healthy Living Network launched their food delivery service and telephone support after the community centre that they worked from closed.

The service ensured their elderly community all got a decent meal and some much-needed social contact – even if it is just a quick chat on the doorstep.

Ann is just one of the 72 people receiving weekly

"You always know that you've got a dinner on a Friday, and there's no shopping about for vegetables, I'm rubbish at that. It's just nice to see a friendly face bring it and they've been so good to me over this lockdown. In the meals we get fresh vegetables, roast chicken, beef casserole, anything you can think of, they've done it!

"When they said they were stopping their normal services and moving to deliveries to keep their staff employed I was all for it. If we can't return to the community centre I hope they continue to provide the meals on wheels service. I think it's great, a big advantage.

"I first joined the community after my husband passed away. It was nice to go because I live alone. It was awful during lockdown, not being able to go anywhere and I was really lonely because my daughter lives further away and couldn't visit."

David, Ann's regular delivery driver, arrived cracking a joke and handing over her weekly meal – casserole is on the menu this week!

With a smile on her face Ann summed-up:

"They've just helped me through the lockdown, if we do end up going back to the centre I will miss this service as it would be one or the other. When I realised this service would be keeping people employed, I knew I had to do it."



It is a perfect Friday evening, children and parents have started filtering onto the pitch as the coaches prepare for their weekly Down syndrome football session.

Solihull Moors Foundation, a charity making positive pathways through the power of sport, were awarded £5,000 from the Solihull Wellbeing & Recovery Fund to safely deliver football sessions for children and young people with learning disabilities.

Phil Miller, Coach at Solihull Moors Foundation, beamed:

"Friday night we have the Downs project, which is great, it's with littluns aged between four and eight, we have a senior group that come later.

It just keeps me going, coming here on a Friday night after a stressful day at work is fantastic. I bring my enjoyment into delivering the project, I'm employed to coach but quite honestly I'd do it voluntary because I just love it.

Seven-year-old James is enjoying himself kicking a football around with the coaches and his friend Juliet. We caught up with his dad, Wayne:

"He loves it, it's not just the football though, it's the interaction. He's got a lot better with the other kids as well. I used to take him to a different class but it wasn't set up for children with disabilities, Downs children don't take instructions very well so these sessions are a lot better as they're less structured.

"When they started to do these sessions here it was like a breath of fresh air because they can play football but it's in a fun and interactive way, they do other coordination stuff as well.

"It was really difficult during lockdown with home-schooling because James would just get bored, when I tell him we have football tonight he just gets so excited and he chooses what kit he wants to wear!"

Sally, James' Mum added:

"Kids like James can't go to the afterschool clubs so it gets a bit painful really, so the fact that we've got this, with a huge pitch, is amazing and it's tailored for them so it's just perfect.

"He's good at sport, if he ends up taking part in the Paralympics I'll be happy with that! It's lovely for the parents to have a catch up, we don't have to get involved because the coaches have it handled."

IT'S SAVING PEOPLE'S LIVES.

Last year, at the peak of the pandemic, the whole nation was glued to the Government's 5pm briefings; the information was vital. It was hard enough to track and trace the guidelines, the scientific developments and the global ramifications as the world came to a halt but imagine not being able to understand those briefings?

Thankfully, Sandwell Deaf Community Association (SDCA) reacted, leaping into a new world and gearing up for the ride. With a limited number of interpreters, SDCA were pulling out highlights, interpreting and projecting the briefings back into the public within a couple of hours; their videos continue to attract more than 5,000 users from across the UK.

Ryan Ball, Communication Service Assistant at SDCA, explained:

"SDCA is a charitable organisation that works within Sandwell and the Black Country.

"We're there at every point in a deaf person's life, from birth to death. Being able to continue that work, we know it's saving people's lives. If people didn't know they'd be putting themselves in danger, they wouldn't be wearing the right PPE, they wouldn't be social distancing."

SDCA received £1,500 from the Coronavirus Resilience Fund, covering staff member's extra hours, allowing them to purchase filming equipment and explore other avenues of support during the pandemic.


Chloe Matthews, Booking Coordinator at SDCA, added:

Imagine being in a world where you don't know why that's happening?

"A lot of deaf people can't understand English, especially when you're watching the news and you've got all these figures, the breaking news bulletins and all that information - subtitles aren't reliable either!

"We felt responsible for our community and the people that rely on us to translate. As soon as we realised there was a need, we picked up the camera and off we went.

"Talking about it makes you realise how important our briefings were. You take it in your stride, it's part of your job, but when someone says, 'thank you' it makes more sense as you do feel, especially while filming, disconnected looking through a screen."



BUILDING BETTER LIVES

THE UPDATE



Unfortunately, due to the difficulties surrounding COVID-19, YMCA Birmingham's build has been delayed several times. We are hoping the 27 transitional housing units will be completed in early 2022!

Pauline Tomlinson, YMCA Chief Executive, said: "Whilst we've hit some challenges with the building of the new flats in Northfield, we're working hard to get the work back on track. This will mean that we can support even more vulnerable young people in taking the next steps towards independent living.

"This project wouldn't have been possible without the funding we received from the Foundation, and we're grateful for their support to make our plans a reality."

ST BASILS

In 2020 St Basils launched Lorna Esien Court.

Jean Templeton, St Basils Chief Executive, said: "The programme has enabled St Basils to provide 32 apartments for young people who are homeless or at risk, to think about their ambitions, and to provide support to develop their skills, talents and overcome some of the barriers which get in the way of achieving those ambitions.

"Thank you for believing in us and supporting our proposal; for trusting us to deliver, and for working alongside us to bring the scheme to life at a very difficult time. Named in memory of our much-respected Deputy Chief Executive, it's now occupied and fulfilling the purpose you trusted us to deliver."



Last month saw Black Country Women's Aid launch a 12-bed refuge in the Black Country which will support victims of modern-day slavery. A vital lifeline to women and girls.

"We're proud that this space has been created by women for women. This new sanctuary will mean that victims of exploitation and slavery will have a safe space to heal and recover. They'll be in a place where they get the right help and never feel alone. Funding from the Foundation has made it all possible and will make a huge difference to the lives of many women."

What a difference a grant makes. The transformation at St Basils' Lorna Esien Court is phenomenal.

Previously a run down, outdated nursing facility, £1m has created homes to be proud of for vulnerable young adults in Coventry and Warwickshire.

Progress Coordinator, Jody Cikac, has been instrumental since the opening:

"I look after the intake, so I'll take referrals, assess them and make recommendations. Will they be suitable here or is there other places better suited for them?

"It's been extremely busy, but it's been great, and I've enjoyed every minute. I feel quite proud to be part of it. I'm from Coventry and it's great to see the young people getting something they need."

Recently settled resident, Danni, beamed when talking about her opportunity:

"I've been here for two months, when I first moved in I thought 'I'm not going to know anyone, I'm not going to like it here' but as soon as I walked through the door you get a nice, warm lovely welcome.

"I was living at my nan's house, well it wasn't just my nan's it was my nan's, my mum's, my auntie's and my friend's – it was a bit all over the place.

"This is the first time I've had somewhere, and I love it, I love the independence, it's so nice. I'm really grateful for this opportunity, I was at a pretty low stage with my mental health and my anxiety but being here has helped, they make you feel like you belong."

After a quick photoshoot we spoke to Rose, originally from Kenya she has mild learning difficulties and was struggling to grow in her home environment:

"I've been here from January. I'm calmer, my confidence has opened and improved in a good way. Jody looks after me, she looks after me a lot. St Basils was the best for me, some things I can do on my own and some things I can't."

Here I've enjoyed living my own independent life, waking up no stress and just being peaceful. I'm enjoying cooking, meeting people, music. The grant, this building, it was so worth it honestly, it's worth it!

BUILDING BETTER OPPORTUNITIES

Funded by the European Social Fund and the National Lottery Community Fund, Building Better Opportunities Community Matters was a three-year employability programme in the Black Country.

Launched in 2016, the £5m project enabled us to work with an initial 19 local partners to deliver a range of services aimed at tackling the barriers to

employment. Supporting over 2,400 people across the Black Country, Forever Consulting evaluated the programme and here is what they found:



The evaluation deemed the programme to be effective with evidence showing a clear relationship between the role of Community Matters in engaging workless people from vulnerable groups and locations.

11% of participants gained employment while a further 13% moved into further education or training – both figures higher than the national average which was 10% and 6% respectively.

VALUE FOR MONEY?

The results showed that the programme achieved excellent value for money, with an estimated £5.78 of social value per each £1 spent!



- Carefully selected delivery partners with a deep understanding of their communities, they were known, trusted and many delivery staff had lived experience.
- The services provided were tailored to people's needs, the support was an alternative to mainstream services, based in community settings and partners often offered informal drop-in sessions in warm and welcoming environments.
- Many delivery partners had been operating long before the BBO programme.



In August 2020 we were the recipients of Charity Today's Community Impact Award, we have won awards in the past, but this was a little bit sweeter!

Voted for by you! Our stakeholders, supporters, donors and above all our friends we were delighted to accept such a prestigious award.

The Charity Today Awards are national accolades with a long history of recognising excellence throughout the sectors.

The nomination came following our response to the Coronavirus pandemic and we were so pleased that the Foundation was recognised for its commitment to the community.

Up against two amazing organisations: The Lewis Foundation, who support adult cancer

patients and Inspire Malawi, who provide inspiring learning opportunities across Malawi, we were delighted to have your backing.

On the award, Tina Costello, said:

"We've won some, we've lost some, but nothing beats it when our supporters have had a say!

"Like everyone we had to adapt quickly and work so hard during the initial stages of the pandemic but it's thanks to our donors, supporters and of course the amazing groups out on the front line that we were able to be recognised for our contribution to the West Midlands and Warwickshire during this time.

"We're not here for the awards, we're here to make a difference in the communities we love – anything else is just a bonus!"
